### Kia ora,

On 22 February Scot Kinley, principal of Bromley School hosted Prime Minister, Jacinda Ardern and Ministers Megan Woods, David Clarke and local MP Poto Williams. The visit included a tour of some of the schools learning spaces, as well as the opportunity to meet students, staff and teachers. They were also treated to a wonderful performance by the school's Kapa Haka group.

While at the school the Prime Minister announced additional mental health support for year 1 - 8 students in greater Christchurch and Kaikoura.



The government will spend \$28 million to provide mental health workers for year 1 – 8 students for earthquake affected schools in greater Christchurch and Kaikoura. This new approach is being developed by Canterbury DHB, the Ministry of Health, other social service providers and ourselves. It will enable resources to be tailored to the needs of each community and align with existing services, providing advice, guidance and support to children, their families, whānau and teachers.



I have included more details in the bulletin regarding the above announcement. We will be hosting an information meeting at our Christchurch office on Monday 12 March, and we will run a repeat of this on Wednesday 14 March for those of you who are unable to attend on the Monday. The meeting will be facilitated by the Canterbury District Health Board.

### Improving mental health services for children in greater Christchurch and Kaikoura

[On 22 February 2018 the Prime Minister announced additional support for year 1 – 8 students in greater Christchurch and Kaikoura.](#) The additional support is to help promote and sustain wellbeing and increase access to services when mental health concerns are identified.

Initially, additional mental health support will be provided to year 1 - 8 students in two Kāhui Ako – Tamai in Linwood and Hornby. We expect this will start in mid-April 2018.

The approach will be trialled in these two Kāhui Ako, before being extended across greater Christchurch and Kaikoura to allow for the development of a larger scale response in 2019 to addressing the wider challenges that children and their families may be facing.

There will be an information meeting at our office facilitated by CDHB on Monday 12 March, and we will repeat the meeting on Wednesday 14 March 2018 at 4pm for those who are unable to attend on the Monday.
