Enrolment Schemes

Amendments to a school's enrolment scheme become necessary for a variety of reasons ranging from the development of a new housing area, unforeseen in-zone roll growth or shifting school population patterns. In cases where several boards in an area are developing schemes at the same time, it might be beneficial to meet jointly and consult with each other, checking that all the home zones mesh neatly.

Please contact us if your board is considering amending or developing an enrolment scheme or if you believe your school no longer needs an enrolment scheme. Your education advisor can provide information and data to help you and they can also assist you with any questions you may have about your current scheme.

The Ministry recommends that boards should be cautious and prudent in offering places to out-of-zone students. With schools planning for next year, boards need to remember that students living within the home zone have an absolute right to be enrolled. A board should not enrol so many out-of-zone students that the capacity of the school would be exceeded if a late rush in applications were to come in from home zone students.

Legislation provides clear guidance to boards on the development of enrolment schemes. [Education Act 1989](#).

Mana Ake – Stronger for Tomorrow

The Mana Ake project design has been realigned in response to the shift from the initial development phase to ongoing implementation and service improvement.

This new phase will see a Practice Lead role complement the existing project structure and realign the current work groups to focus on enhancing practice and implementation support for schools, kaimahi and providers.

Interesting Fact

Canterbury is increasingly more diverse, and the rate of growth in diversity has increased in recent years.

In the Canterbury and Chatham Islands' education region, the proportion of students identifying as Māori increased from 10.6% in 2007 to 14.2% in 2017, the proportion of students identifying as Pasifika increased from 3.0% in 2007 to 4.3% in 2017, and the proportion of students identifying as Asian increased from 5.1% in 2007 to 9.5% in 2017.

Across Canterbury as a whole, the total number of Year 1-8 students increased by 7% between 2007 and 2017.

The total number of Year 1-8 students in Ashburton District increased by 22% between 2007 and 2017, and the total number of Year 1-8 students in Selwyn District increased by 65%.
