Last week was the fifth anniversary of the September 2010 7.1 magnitude earthquake. This was a notable day for Canterbury and we are acutely aware the impact of decisions made in the wake of the traumatic events of 2010 and 2011 will be felt not only by today's children, but by future generations. Thank you all for your support as we continue to meet the educational needs of children and young people, and support social, cultural and economic recovery.

On the 1st September the Ashburton community marked the one-year anniversary of the tragic events that took place at the Ashburton Work and Income office. We know this is an incredibly hard journey for everyone involved and our thoughts and support are with everyone affected.

The Ministerial Cross-Sector Forum was also held last week; this was a great opportunity for us as a region to provide collaborative cross-sector leadership and advice to the Minister. This Forum brings together leaders to share and exchange information, which is then shared with our communities.

Chatham Islands

I had the pleasure of visiting the Chatham Islands in August. Thank you to those who facilitated the visit, your guidance and assistance was much appreciated.

Chatham Island has three early childhood services for the under fives: a Kohanga Reo and playgroups at Te One, and Kaingaroa. There are three primary schools: two on Chatham Island (Te One and Kaingaroa) and one on Pitt Island.

The majority of secondary school-aged students leave the island for boarding schools in mainland New Zealand. A small number remain on the island and carry out their secondary education through correspondence.

Thank you to Kaingaroa School for your gift of honey. Having bee hives is a great idea and a wonderful way to raise young people's awareness of the environment.

Grow Waitaha (Transformation)

The Canterbury earthquakes presented the region with many challenges. Our aim is to turn those challenges into opportunities that support a vision of greater Christchurch as the leading education community in New Zealand, with every child and young person engaged in learning and reaching their potential.

A programme has been developed after conversations with principals and sector leaders regarding the need for support and a framework for professional learning to assist teachers develop innovative collaborative teaching and learning, and to assist educational leaders embrace emerging pedagogies.

We have been working with Mātauraka Mahaanui and four external providers to develop a programme to support the transformation process in schools as they look towards teaching and learning in different ways. We now have a model put together for the programme which we are calling 'Grow Waitaha'.

This is available to all schools in Canterbury and we will work with schools to ensure the right support is available at the right time. Priority will be given to schools in or entering the CSR Programme, and schools undergoing major rebuild and development in Canterbury.

In the build-up to the opening we’re running an art competition for Canterbury children called The Tremendous Tatty Patchwork Competition. We’d love your students to get involved and help create a giant patchwork to decorate signage and buildings on the playground site – just like Selina and her grandmother, Mrs Polly, who created magnificent patchworks in Margaret Mahy’s story The Tatty Patchwork Rubbish Dump Dancers (From The Chewing Gum Rescue and other stories).



We’re asking children to create a single patch inspired by nature and the Canterbury region – cityscapes, landscapes, plant-life, wild-life, mountain tops or sea beds – the possibilities are endless.
