Bulk email to Canterbury schools: Asbestos Management Plan and Survey Requirements

Asbestos Assessors NZ (AANZ) has bulk emailed a majority of schools in our region stating they must have an Asbestos Management Plan and offering their services. We have subsequently contacted WorkSafe about this email and have confirmed that this information is **incorrect**. Where asbestos has been identified, or is assumed to exist in school buildings, an Asbestos Management Plan must be in place, which sets out how the identified asbestos or asbestos containing material will be managed. You can create your own Asbestos Management Plan and assume your own buildings to contain asbestos provided WorkSafe NZ Guidance is followed. You do not need to use an asbestos surveyor.

Our National Office property team and WorkSafe NZ are working on a joint factsheet about asbestos management in schools which we will forward to you once completed. In addition, our website is currently being updated to further clarify the requirements for asbestos management plans and surveys.

Communities of Learning | Kāhui Ako - Progress in Canterbury

Carmel Brosnahan-Pye from St Joseph's School in Timaru has now been appointed as the South Canterbury Catholic Kāhui Ako Leader. She has already dedicated a considerable amount of time to developing the Kāhui Ako achievement challenges document, congratulations Carmel.

There are now 24 approved Communities of Learning in Canterbury. These Kāhui Ako include: 191 schools/kura, 49 early learning services me ngā kohānga reo, 2 tertiary providers and over 63,790 students.

Learning Community Cluster Support

With more than 60% of schools from the Learning Community Clusters established in Greater Christchurch after the earthquakes now involved in a Community of Learning | Kāhui Ako, and substantially less money in the supporting budget for the next financial year, funding for cluster leadership or to support cluster projects will end on 30 June 2017.
