Grow Waitaha

Supporting schools through the process of change happening in Canterbury

Grow Waitaha is a Ministry of Education funded programme to help support schools in Canterbury with collaborative and innovative pedagogy. Grow Waitaha is a collaboration of the Ministry, Ngai Tāhu, CORE Education, Evaluation Associates, Leadership Lab and Massey University School of Design.

Many schools in Canterbury are being rebuilt (completely or partially) after the earthquakes. Rather than simply rebuilding those schools as they were, we have an opportunity to look ahead and construct innovative physical environments that enable future-focused education for all learners and their communities. Building new learning environments means developing new ways of working in those environments. Grow Waitaha is supporting schools through this process of change.

We have continued to develop the Grow Waitaha programme and support for term one is underway. You can find more information on these opportunities here. These opportunities consist of forums on a range of topics and two communities of practice building on forum topics from 2015. The opportunities are available to all schools in the Canterbury region and are free of charge.

Review of Enrolment Scheme

Reminder to check if your school's enrolment scheme is due for review this year: The review of enrolment schemes is required under Section 11PA of the Education Act 1989, and provides an opportunity for your board and the Ministry of Education to consider the operation of the scheme, and whether it still meets the legislative purposes and principles.

Note that the Education Act 1989 sets a statutory deadline of 1 May for completing the review. For the review response form, please click here.

Under Section 11PA(1) the board is required to:

- review the operation of the enrolment scheme, having regard to the purpose and principles of enrolment schemes (Section 11A of the Education Act 1989); and;
- ask the Secretary whether he or she agrees with the Board's view about the continuing need for a scheme to prevent overcrowding, or the likelihood of overcrowding, at the school.

Effectively, this means that you should consider whether:

- the school continues to need an enrolment scheme to prevent overcrowding or the likelihood of overcrowding at the school;
- the scheme in its present form promotes fairness and transparency in the selection of students;
- the scheme in its present form promotes best use of the existing network of state schools in the area;
- the scheme excludes local students;
- some amendment to the home zone is appropriate i.e. does the current enrolment scheme home zone reflect your immediate school community

If the Board of Trustees is considering changing or abandoning the enrolment scheme, these changes will be worked through as part of a discussion with your neighbouring schools. We are happy to assist you with the meeting arrangements and the information and data that you may wish to share with neighbouring schools. At this stage, all that is required by 1 May is for the board of trustees to indicate on the review response form, its decision.
