Transformation of Practice

Delivering a teaching practice programme is key to the future of the Christchurch Education network to make sure the significant capital investment in refurbishing, remodelling, rebuilding and renewing our school properties is realised.

On 21 and 22 June, the Ministry of Education is hosting a hui with the consortium of providers selected as part of the Transforming Education delivery panel, Ngāi Tahu and principal association representatives. The hui will focus on the collective visioning for education in Canterbury, reviewing the current situation around support to schools, sharing the provider's offering and proposals, and collaboratively planning a range of future support to accelerate the vision for education renewal through transformation.

Support will be available to state and state integrated schools in Canterbury (individually or in a cluster context) pre-construction, during construction and post-construction if a school is in the CSR or any other build programme. Schools not in a build programme can get support around visioning and changing teaching practice.

ECE services and schools in the Hornby Learning Community (HNLC) have been on a journey for the past 18 months as relationships have been built within a framework of transition hui hosted by different schools. The journey has enabled and supported a climate of trust, respect and curiosity built through ongoing conversations where children, families/whānau have been central to the collaborative thinking and actions.

Opportunities to work with ECE colleagues to generate and create documents that ensure we get information about transitioning children that is valuable, genuine, purposeful and insightful.

Early on the group agreed upon a project that would connect an understanding of pedagogy, philosophical difference and practical support within the transition space. The focus was on creating a document which would support a child and their family/whānau within the transition space. The document has five main headings which are designed to capture the uniqueness of a child and their family/whānau; their strengths; disposition and character, and areas where a child might be supported.

The transition document was supported by a robust and rigorous discussion about what each heading meant to them as individuals, and as schools and ECE services. A supporting document was created from these discussions with key indicators and reflection points under each heading to support the thinking and writing for each child.

The document now 'lives' within the community as a reflection of this group's dedication to children and their community and their aspiration to do the very best they can within the transition space.

Receiving our first transition document was very exciting as it represented our vision and aspirations for our community...and I got to know a little girl in a very personal and professional way.
