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Education Renewal



Year 7 and 8 students welcomed at Hornby High, Hillmorton High and Linwood College

The year has kicked off with the expansion of three secondary schools to take in Year 7 and 8 students for the first time.

New and refurbished teaching spaces have opened at Hornby High School, Hillmorton High School and Linwood College following the Minister of Education's decision last year that they would become Year 7-13 composite schools.

The new teaching spaces at the three schools are all modern learning environments, meaning open areas for communal and group activities can be integrated with smaller, quiet spaces and break out areas for individualised learning. Teachers can adapt their environment to suit their teaching programmes and learning needs, which in turn can influence better educational outcomes for students.

Each school has held an official opening ceremony to welcome their new Year 7 and 8 students. At the Hornby High ceremony Principal Richard Edmundson highlighted the benefits of the new teaching spaces.

"Our new Year 7 and 8 teaching spaces are designed to create and sustain student engagement and achievement. The style of teaching matches that dynamic. We are now a 21st century school for 21st century learners."

The new classrooms at the three schools offer the first glimpse of the new facilities that a number of Christchurch schools will gain over the next decade as part of the \$1.137 billion rebuild.

Learning Community Cluster leaders

The process of appointing Learning Community Cluster Leaders for the 39 clusters is well underway with 23 leaders either having been appointed or in the process of being appointed. There are a number of other clusters in the final stages of deciding who they would like to act as their leaders.

The role of the Learning Community Cluster (LCC) Leader is to work with education providers in the cluster to:

- develop a shared vision and goals and the completion of a high level Learning Community Cluster plan
- analyse and develop a shared understanding of current achievement data across the Learning Community Cluster
- implement activities that engage the community in Learning Community Cluster planning
- begin implementing activities aimed at achieving the vision and goals of their high level plan.

Learning Community Cluster leaders are a vital step in helping clusters achieve at the highest level and the Ministry's Operational Delivery Advisors are working closely with them to support and help ensure their success. The leaders will be holding ongoing meetings as a group to share ideas and inform the Ministry on how to best assist them achieve their goals.

Aranui community campus consultation

Three months of community consultation on the proposed new Aranui Community Campus concluded in December 2013.

The Aranui Community Leadership Group (ACLG), which led the consultation, held community meetings with the four schools - Aranui High School, Aranui School, Avondale School and Wainoni School. In addition drop-in sessions and a large community forum were held. The ACLG also attended the AFFIRM community fair in December.

Earlier this month the ACLG hosted a consultation summary evening for the community and stakeholders. This was an opportunity to hear an overview of the ideas and information that was collected during the Aranui Community Campus consultation.

A paper summarising the information that was collected during the consultation has been written and is expected to be provided to the Minister of Education by the end of February.

EDI funding

Some schools will be starting the new school year with new students who previously attended schools that have now closed or merged. The Ministry of Education makes Educational Development Initiative (EDI) funding available to schools to support the ongoing education of these students. Each school who receives students from a closed or merged school, even if the student is entering Year 9, can access the funding.

International Summit on the Teaching Profession

On 28 and 29 March 2014, New Zealand will host the fourth International Summit on the Teaching Profession (ISTP) in Wellington. The theme for the 2014 summit is "Excellence, Equity and Inclusiveness – High quality teaching for all".

The ISTP brings together education ministers and leaders of national teachers' federations and teachers' unions from jurisdictions that, according to the OECD's 2009 PISA survey results, have high-performing or rapidly-improving school systems.

\$200 million insurance settlement for Canterbury schools

In late January Canterbury Earthquake Recovery Minister Gerry Brownlee, Education Minister Hekia Parata and Associate Education Minister Nikki Kaye announced a \$200 million insurance settlement for earthquake damage to Canterbury schools.

The settlement between the Ministry of Education and Vero Insurance is one of the largest insurance pay outs in New Zealand's history. The Ministry's claim was one big claim that involved 214 schools in Canterbury.

The money will be a direct contribution to the repair and renewal of schools' infrastructure across greater Christchurch.

The Education Minister said the settlement is great news for Canterbury schools, the community and the Government.

"With a \$1.1 billion investment in education renewal in greater Christchurch over the next decade already underway, this settlement gives impetus to the largest ever investment in a region's educational facilities."
