Kia ora,

I hope you all managed to have a restful term break. At the end of Term 1 and beginning of Term 2, some of our schools marked some special milestones.

Linwood College's original buildings are scheduled for demolition in preparation for their rebuild and at the end of Term 1, the school had a farewell celebration weekend. Former students and many others who have been involved with the college came together to celebrate and recognise the school's many achievements over the past 65 years. Linwood College will operate from the former Avonside Girls' High School site during their rebuild.

On the last day of Term 1, Diamond Harbour School was joined by their community and Ministry staff to celebrate the beginning of the construction stage of their redevelopment. Much hard work has taken place to get to this point and a sod turning ceremony was held to mark the occasion. Key aspects of their redevelopment include the total refurbishment of the school's main teaching block and the building of a new administration block.

To mark the start of construction of new school Te Matauru Primary School in Rangiora, the local community joined the foundation principal Danny Nicholls and establishment board members at a sod turning ceremony. The school name, meaning "eyes to the west", was gifted to the school by the Tuahiwi runanga, Ngai Tuahuriri.

Ao Tawhiti Unlimited Discovery School returned to central Christchurch at the beginning of Term 2. The school has been operating in Halswell and Ilam since losing their central city premises in the earthquakes. Congratulations to everyone involved in this redevelopment; I know how excited the school is to be back in the city.

Avonside Girls' High School and Shirley Boys' High School moved from their original sites at the end of the Term 1 to their new state of the art campus at the beginning of this term. Ferndale Schools' secondary-level satellite unit will also be co-located on the site. We have worked closely with the schools to ensure the new campus meets each school's approach to teaching and learning. The co-location of Avonside Girls' and Shirley Boys' High Schools will provide a significant opportunity for the two schools. They will be able to collaborate in a range of ways while continuing to operate independently, maintaining their individual character and focus. Both schools will continue their long and proud histories of delivering high quality single sex education.

SPACPAC Canterbury Polyfest was held on Saturday 4 May. Seventeen secondary schools celebrated their Pacific youth through cultural performance. A full story and images of this amazing event will be in the next bulletin.
