Kia ora,

We remain mindful of the accused mosque shooter court appearances and consequent media reporting which may impact on some of your staff, students and whānau. The next scheduled court appearance of the accused is 12 December.

We are asking schools to be particularly vigilant where they know children and families were directly affected by this event. We have a focus on intervening early and ensuring families are well supported, regardless of whether their children are showing signs of distress. Please talk with any of the professionals working with your school community including Fiona Bartley from our office, RTLB school liaison, public health nurse, school based mental health team and Mana Ake liaison kaimahi to ensure families are connected with appropriate support in a timely way.

The agencies supporting children and families who have experienced trauma relating to March 15 have developed an agreed pathway now on <u>Leading Lights</u>. A reminder we have advice on <u>reassuring children</u> and young people and helping them feel safe on our website and what to look for in a child's emotional state. We also have information on <u>providing guidance to children and young people</u>. Further information for supporting families is available on the Canterbury Resilience Hub

Youth Diversity Forum – exploring ways to prevent further racism

The NZ National Commission for UNESCO recently partnered with Human Rights Commission, Ngāi Tūāhuriri and Ngāi Tahu to host a Youth Diversity Forum in Christchurch to support a cross ethnic youth discussion on addressing racism in response to the mosque attacks of 15 March.

It brought together nearly a hundred youth leaders from Christchurch and around the country to inspire and empower young people to be agents for change.

The focus was on the future of race relations in New Zealand in line with UNESCO's mandate of building peace through dialogue.

At the closing ceremony key messages were presented to a wide range of organisations. These messages will contribute to New Zealand's position at the 11th UNESCO Youth Forum 2019 and discussions at the 40th UNESCO General Conference, both in November in Paris.

You Matter to Us initiative

The You Matter to Us wellbeing team (led by NZ Police and Ministry of Education comprising 18 partner agencies and non-government agencies) was established to reduce harm and impact on intergenerational crime in a neighbourhood in East Christchurch. The team works with the community to reduce the impact of adverse childhood experiences that may lead to negative outcomes (including pathways into crime) later in life and build a safer, stronger community. Teams identify vulnerable children to ensure they participate in early childhood education and have access to health and social services.

The initiative is an outstanding example of how working together makes a real difference in helping our communities. This year at the NZ Problem-Orientated Policing (POP) Awards the You Matter to Us initiative won the Excellence in Reducing Harm from Crime category. Congratulations to everyone involved in this work.

In November, police officers, crime consultants and crime researchers will meet to discuss what they have learned to reduce crime and safety problems at the international Annual Problem-Oriented Policing Conference in California.

In addition to the conference, police agencies that successfully resolve recurring community crime or disorder problems are eligible to submit their project for the Herman Goldstein Awards. You Matter to Us will be presented as one of the finalists in the awards.

Finalists present at the conference where winners are announced. Judges consider a number of factors to include the depth of problem, analysis, development of clear and realistic response goals, relevant measures of effectiveness and involvement of people and other organisations in problem resolution.
